Bishop's Office to move

ollowing several years of discernment, the Bishop announced at the 2014 Convention that the diocese would begin the process of moving Diocesan offices to Pierre.

The Diocese has since finalized the purchase a house in Pierre for the Bishop's Residence. The Tarrants will be moved into it by the end of July.

The Vestry of Trinity Church in Pierre and the Diocesan Council have

both approved the use of the office wing of Trinity Church for the offices of the Bishop and Diocesan Staff. This summer some remodeling will occur to accommodate the diocesan and parish needs.

The Diocesan Offices will be moved to Pierre gradually.

The Bishop will begin setting up his office sometime in July.

The Canon to the Ordinary will have his office adjacent to the Bishop's which will allow even better communication and coordination.

Mary Armin is retiring at the end of August, 2015 and her replacement will be expected to live in the Pierre area. We are hopeful this person will be able to begin in early August to allow adequate training and transition, including packing, moving, and setting up the office and files.

Barney's office will remain at Calvary Cathedral in the diocesan conference room. The rest of the diocesan space at the Cathedral will be

> rented out to a non-profit agency. The status of Calvary Cathedral remains the same and will not change.

Which office to call and what to send where will become clear over time as we all develop new routines and experiences. Basically every-

thing financial-related goes to Sioux Falls; anything else goes to Pierre. But there will never be a wrong address or wrong phone number as the two offices will be in easy contact. Diocesan staff is here to support you.

This means a very busy summer for many people, but it will have a good result. With the Bishop and diocesan offices centrally located in the diocese, we can be more responsive and better serve the churches and people of this diocese.



From the Bishop



This month I will share some updates and rumor control.

- The Diocese has purchased a bishop's residence" in Pierre. This house should not only serve us now, but also bishops in the future. We have borrowed the money from our endowment and will pay it back over time. The Diocese will begin to see immediate savings by dropping the bishop's housing allowance. We have received over \$35,000 in pledges toward paying pay back our funds. All contributions are appreciated.
 My family and I are moving on July
- With the concurring agreement of the Trinity Church vestry and Diocesan Council, Diocesan offices will be located in the office wing of Trinity Church, Pierre. Renovations to that space are being done as you read this newsletter.
- Diocesan offices will move during the month of August. All non-financial records will be moved to Pierre. The Diocesan archives will remain at the Augustana Center for Western Studies in Sioux Falls.
- . Mary Armin will retire on August 31. Her replacement will be from the Pierre area. We hope that person can begin in early August and work together with Mary for that month. Mary will also be available to assist at September's Diocesan Convention. We will honor her for her service at that Convention.
- Diocesan Administrator, Randy Barnhardt (Barney) will remain in Sioux Falls. He has **no** plans for retirement, despite rumors to the contrary. The financial office, along with financial records, will remain in his office at the Cathedral. All financial concerns, along with checks, should be sent to the current address (500 S. Main Ave, Sioux Falls). UTO and CPC checks should be sent this address as well.
- . All non-financial correspondence should be sent to: The Episcopal Diocese of South Dakota, 408 N. Jefferson, Pierre, SD 57501.
- All correspondence with the bishop's office, Church News, Niobrara School for Ministry, Canon David Hussey, and general non-financial business should be sent to the Pierre address.

- 9. Canon David Hussey will have an office at Trinity, Pierre. Archdeacon Paul Sneve will continue as vicar of St. Paul's, Vermillion along with his Diocesan duties and he will maintain an office at St. Paul's. The Rev. Portia Corbin, Missioner for Youth Adult Ministry, will continue as vicar of Trinity Church, Watertown along with her Diocesan duties and maintain an office in Watertown. The complete Diocesan staff will meet in Pierre at least monthly.
- All Diocesan staff will retain the same email addresses. There will be a change of phone numbers eventually, but 605-338-9751 will get you to the right person either directly or with a transfer for a year or so. You will be notified of any new numbers.
- The Diocese is negotiating with a nonprofit to rent our current space at the Cathedral. These resources will help offset office expenses in Pierre.
 Barney's office will be moved to a different location in the Cathedral building.

I hope this information is helpful. Transitions are never easy and it will take time to figure out the glitches, but it seems like an important strategy to move the "center" of the Diocese to the center of the Diocese.




S t. Paul's in Brookings is a certified member of the National Wildlife Federation. They were notified that heir Ralph Town Garden is certified as a Garden for Wildlife, meaning that it provides food, water, cover, and places to raise young.

St Paul's also received an Honorable Mention Award in the Cool Congregations Challenge sponsored by Interfaith Power and Light. They received the award in the category titled "Sacred Grounds," which usually means that a congregation has done an ecology project on the Parish grounds. The award nomination stated that they had finished a 4-year project to reduce their carbon footprint by converting lawn to urban wildlife habitat and to provide contemplative gardens where people can appreciate The Creation.

Their landscaping project focused on three areas of the Parish grounds:

- 1. front yard conversion of grass to native flowers and shrubs
- 2. back yard conversion of grass to a permeablesurface patio and gardens, and
- 3. gardening for wildlife throughout (the Ralph Town Memorial goal).

Their energy savings from reduced watering and mowing was small compared to other Congregations in their award category. However, "although St Paul's energy impacts are small, the savings may be increased when Parishioners, visitors, and neighbors learn about and see the benefits of landscaping with ecological goals."

In the April issue, the Rev. David Seger (Emmanuel, Rapid City) wrote a few words about The General Convention of The Episcopal Church and its structure. Here is his next installment.

T he convention opens in Salt Lake City on June 25, and adjourns nine days later on July 3. About two hundred resolutions will be introduced between the House of Deputies (laity and clergy) and the House of Bishops. Only a few of these will eventually make it out of committee to be debated on the floor of both houses.

At this convention, the House of Bishops will elect the 27th Presiding Bishop of The Episcopal Church to a nine-year term to succeed the Most Reverend Katharine Jefferts Schori, the first female Presiding Bishop in our church.

The four nominees are:

The Right Reverend Thomas E. Breidenthal, Bishop of Southern Ohio

The Right Reverend Michael B. Curry, Bishop of North Carolina

The Right Reverend Ian T. Douglas,

Bishop of Connecticut

The Right Reverend Dabney T. Smith, Bishop of Southwest Florida

The bishops are scheduled to elect on the third day of the convention, June 27. Approximately three hundred bishops (active and retired) are eligible to vote. The next "PB" must receive a simple majority to be elected. Following the election, the House of Deputies must confirm the election.

There will likely be some announcement of this in the secular press.

A second important matter for the church will be

several resolutions to restructure The Episcopal Church. These matters will likely not attract much attention in the daily news.

The third matter to draw attention will be the revision of those canons that apply to the Sacrament of Marriage. This is a complex matter with persons of good will on each side of this sensitive matter. This will, we predict, be the issue that attracts the most attention in the secular press. Sensitive matters for the church tend to be sensationalized and often reported incorrectly by the news media. We urge that you not overreact to whatever makes its way through the convention. If you wish to really be informed, it is necessary to read the resolution(s) that are adopted for yourselves and the rationale for doing so. This is likely to be couched in theological language and requires careful study. You will not find this in the popular reporting.

We believe this is an exciting time for The Episcopal Church as it turns its face to the "joys and challenges of a global community called to mission and filled with hope." If we rely only on statistics, we have little reason to be optimistic. Here are just a few of the national numbers:

- Nation-wide Average Sunday Attendance (ASA) has dropped from 80 to 61 in the last thirteen years.
- Nearly half (45%) of domestic parishes and missions are served by clergy who are not full time.
- The average age of those ordained continues slowly to rise; currently the average age is 48 years old.

- The advanced and still advancing age of the Church's membership, combined with a low birth rate, means that the Church loses 16,000 people a year — nearly the equivalent of one average-sized diocese per year through deaths over births.
- In 2014, 38% of Episcopal congregations (versus 28% in 2010) report that their financial condition is good or excellent. At the same time 62% of congregations are in some kind of financial stress in 2014, as compared to 72% in 2010, and only 44% in 2000.

So, where is the good news? Fewer congregations report being in conflict than in previous years. Money has replaced issues of human sexuality as the most commonly reported topic of conflict. Dioceses that were once in conflict and have reorganized continue to explore creative ways to thrive and serve.

We need to change the ways in which we assess vitality. More than just people in the pews define a vital church on Sunday morning. Soft data offers hope and optimism, not despair and resignation. The question is not "are we dying," but rather "where is resurrection occurring?" We need to remind ourselves that we are an Easter people!

It comprises the House of Bishops, with upwards of 200 active and retired bishops, and the House of Deputies, with clergy and lay deputies elected from the 108 dioceses and three regional areas of the Church, at more than 800 members.



COM Activities

COM meets twice a year to review the people in the process, to interview those applying for postulancy, and to make recommendations to the Standing Committee and the Bishop for postulancy, candidacy, and ordination.

Each person in the process has a COM advocate. The advocate keeps in communication with the person during the year and makes a report at each meeting. Each person in the process also has a mentor in their area that works with the educational requirements for ordination, as well as overseeing local ministries. COM also works closely with the Board of Examining Chaplains to ensure that educational components are met.

There are currently 6 persons in the discernment phase, 11 postulants and 1 candidate. Since convention last year, there have been 2 recommendations for ordination.

Al Ahli Hospital in Gaza City, Gaza

Imagine operating a hospital that mostly treats warrelated injuries and burns and traumatized children, with scarce supplies, using generators for power, without drinkable tap water and proper sewage treatment, in a neighborhood filling with uncollected garbage . . . and the list goes on. Yet the Diocese of Jerusalem has committed to keeping the doors open at Al Ahli despite financial stress and an uncertain future.

The Diocese operates two major hospitals — in two very volatile locations — with more than 200 beds, four outpatient clinics, and a growing number of mobile clinics. St. Luke's Hospital in Nablus, Palestine, and Al Ahli Hospital in Gaza City, Gaza, serve the needs of more than 56,000 outpatients and 12,000 inpatients annually, in addition to hundreds of surgeries and thousands of lab tests and examinations. Through compassionate medical care, these healthcare professionals make respect and dignity for each patient part of the experience.

The Diocese raised \$750,000 in 2014 alone to address the humanitarian crisis in Gaza. Al Ahli Hospital treats the poor and uninsured in a volatile place. And a \$65,000 major gift, along with substantial additional support from AFEDJ donors, purchased essential medical equipment and covered the cost of renovations to open a clinic specializing in diabetes in Ramallah.

Al Ahli Hospital is located in the one of the most volatile places on earth. It is the oldest hospital in Gaza and the only remaining full-service independent hospital in Gaza. They welcome all, regardless of religious, ethnic or economic background and provide compassionate care to some of the neediest. In response to the escalating prevalence of cancer and lack of treatment facilities in Gaza, Al Ahli Hospital is transitioning to become a cancer diagnostic and treatment facility.

Standing Committee

With a Bishop in charge of the Diocese, the Standing Committee shall be the Bishop's Council of Advice. When the Diocese is without a Bishop...the Standing Committee of the diocese shall be the Ecclesiastical Authority as provided by the General Convention Constitution and Canons. The Standing Committee also plays a part in the ordination process and deals with certain property issues.

The Standing Committee consists of eight members, and election shall be made by the diocesan convention for a term of four years. Members are entitled to election for two terms. The Standing Committee meets 3-4 times a year, or as needed.

A member of Standing Committee is a voting delegate to Annual Convention. A member of Standing Committee is also a member of the Title IV Ecclesiastical Disciplinary Board.
