# Youth in the Church

t. Andrew's Good Word (St. Andrew's, Rapid City) is one of several excellent parish newsletters in this diocese.

Their February issue contained reflections by three people on and around the topic of children and young people in church. Some of it is excerpted here.

#### The Rev. Kathy Monson Lutes' Reflections

Why are you an Episcopalian? I asked this question of our youth group and our confirmands the other night, and it's a good question to think about for all of us.

#### I am an Episcopalian because

- when I walked into the Episcopal church very many years ago, I felt like I had come home
- the gifts God has given me as a leader and as a minister are valued.
- something happens that is not of me when I participate in Holy Communion, and in the prayers.
- many people seem to "get" that this is not about how any one of us feels, but it's about who we are together and how God effects healing in the world.
- everyone is welcome, everyone is welcome, everyone is welcome.
- we strive for justice and peace among all

- people, and respect the dignity of every human being.
- where two or three are gathered, there is God, and disagreement.

#### I am at St. Andrew's because

- all people are welcomed and valued, including and especially children.
- we take seriously transformational faith formation.
- this is a little church that makes a HUGE impact on the community through its outreach.

#### The View from a Pew - Shelli Vallis

Most of you know that the particular "pew" from which I view is actually a chair in the choir section – the best seat in the house. What I have enjoyed most about my view is watching the very young children who are at the altar assisting Kathy and the deacon during Holy Communion.

As the service proceeds, they are learning the Liturgy— some already know all of the words. They hold the basket containing the bread, the Body of Christ— and the cup of wine, the Blood of Christ. They are the first to receive. I won't pretend to know what they think of all of this, but here's what I hope they *feel*:

**ishop George Young**, the newly ordained bishop for the Diocese of East Tennessee, invited me to attend their Diocesan Convention in mid-February. Pat was able to join me as we continued to strengthen relationships with our companion diocese. There was a wonderful spirit at their convention and a lot of enthusiasm around continuing our diocesan companion relationship.

Representatives from many of the congregations in East Tennessee spoke to me about their desire to strengthen relationships with their sister congregations in South Dakota. I heard this over and over again. We are in the process of redoing the "sister congregation" list. If you have a relationship with a congregation from East Tennessee, please, let us know so we can include that in our updated list.

Our youth program on Standing Rock Mission continues to grow. We now have an average attendance of between 50 to 60 teenagers combined at the McLaughlin and Wakpala sites. Through the committed leadership of **Deacon Brandon** Mauai, Fr. Rob and Jeanne Schwarz, and other lay support helpers we are seeing the project begin to impact the lives of those who are participating. (We need only \$15,000 more to complete the matching \$100,000 grant.)

We are hoping to receive a grant to expand the program to include a tutoring component. We have applied for a grant to enable us to offer a homework and tutoring program on a separate night of the week. We will use the older teenagers and local college students to help children from the school in Wakpala with home-

work and to offer tutoring where needed. We believe this will add a strong relational aspect to the program using the traditional value of older young people helping the children. This program will also emphasize the importance of education through action rather than words.

We continue to move forward with our development of the intentional Christian adult community at the Bishop Hare complex in Mission. We are hoping to launch the community in September using the summer months to carefully develop the program. We have also applied for a grant to help support this effort.

Our ministry continues to grow deeper as we embrace the challenges of a changing church and changing world. We are, indeed, faced with many challenges, but we are working diligently to turn each challenge into an opportunity. It is an exciting time to be part of the Diocese of South Dakota.

Please, keep our Diocese and me in your prayers as I keep you in mine.

#### Sneve book wins award

his year's American Indian Youth Literature Awards, announced during the American Library Association's (ALA) January 20-24 meeting, honored, among other titles, The Christmas Coat: Memories of My Sioux Childhood (Holiday House, 2011) by Virginia Driving Hawk Sneve, Rosebud Sioux Tribe, illustrated by Ellen Beier, in the picture book category.

Based on Sneve's experiences growing up, it tells the story of a chilly little girl wishing for a new winter coat on the Rosebud Reservation in South Dakota.



The children's book award was created as a way to identify and honor the very best writing and illustrations by and about American Indians. Nominated titles in each category represent the best in American Indian books for children and youth. Books selected to receive the award will present American Indians in the fullness of their humanity in the present and past contexts.

The First American Indian Library Association American Indian Youth Literature Awards were selected and presented during the Joint Conference of Librarians of Color at Dallas Texas in 2006. Winners were chosen in three categories: picture book, middle school, and young adult.

The awards were created "to identify and honor the very best writing and illustrations by and about American Indians, Alaska Natives, Canadian First Nations and Native Hawaiians. . . The winning and honorable mention titles authentically convey the past and present of the American Indian experience," the AILA said in a statement.

Handmade scarves, all in the official colors of Navy and Cherry Red, will be symbols of unity, support, compassion and empowerment as the Special Olympics athletes, coaches, families, volunteers and supporters wear them with pride.

The idea for a scarf project resulted from an opportunity to provide a gift of welcome for the athletes of the 2009 Special Olympics World Winter Games held in Boise, Idaho. A call for 5,000 blue and white scarves went out: by Games time nearly 60,000 had arrived from every US state and twelve countries around the world!



In 2011, the Scarf Project spread its wings and went national. If all forty participating states meet their individual goals for 2012, there will be over 41,000 members of the Special Olympics family wrapped in love and encouragement symbolized by these scarves.

Trinity Pierre's Prayer Shawl Ministry is participating in the project for the first time this year, and has contributed 19 to South Dakota's requested 900 scarves. These will be worn at South Dakota's 2012 Special Olympics State Basketball Tournament (Team, Unified, and Skills) to be held in Yankton on March 9 and 10. Trinity's group hopes to participate every year; the 2013 scarf colors will be announced in April, allowing plenty of time to knit and crochet.

- that they are important members of this community, not just tolerated; we're not just waiting for them to "grow up" into their roles as full members of the Body of Christ.
- that they have abilities beyond even their own expectations.
- that they are trusted with *things and moments* of great value.
- that "church" is a place where they are a vital part of every moment of prayer, praise, joy and sorrow.
- that we miss them when they are not with us every Sunday.
- that this is a place where they are safe and loved.

Here's the best part: We are all God's children—no matter what our stature or chronological age. We are all perfectly able to be fully functioning members at any time. We are safe, loved, welcomed and missed. We will all have moments of caring for others and moments when we need care. We will be the light for someone walking in great darkness and we will walk beside someone who can carry the light for us. We will stand shoulder to shoulder at the table with a whole bunch of imperfect, but perfectly loved, people of all ages—and we will leave renewed, strengthened and forgiven. Thanks be to God.

#### **Deacon Marty Garwood:**

I often hear folks comment about how different the world is today than it was when they were children. As a child of the 1950's, I have to agree. I am also a child of the Episcopal Church. And yes, the church is also a very different place now than it was when I was growing up. As children, we were excused during the middle of most services to go downstairs for Sunday school. Needless to say, not being able to participate in that adult activity of Holy Communion was enough to convince this child that something very special was taking place.

I am sure that there were rules and guidelines about being an acolyte. But whatever those were, they didn't apply to me. I was only a girl after all, so there was no room for me to serve in the church. I was well advanced into my adult years before I was invited to serve as an acolyte at an Ash Wednesday service here at St. Andrew's. I don't know if Father Hibbert was aware of how moved I was by that invitation and experience.

I want to thank all of you at St. Andrew's for allowing our children to live into a ministry of serving at the altar. Yes, we may all cringe on occasion when they don't stand still or a head is laid down on the altar cloth for a moment. Sometimes it may even seem a little chaotic when we have a number of small bodies to work around. But one thing is for sure, the children don't feel excluded from participating. And they learn with practice, and the rough edges are smoothed.

Children often are not as self-conscious as we adults. There have been times that I have envied the freedom of the children who minister at the altar with us. What a gift to feel the joy of being within the Sacred and to be able to express that joy with a quick whirling dance!

And what a gift it is to be a deacon among all of you who encourage and support the ministries of one another – no matter where they might fall on the age spectrum. And by the way, there is no upper age limit to be an acolyte. Jan Laitos was in his 80's the first time he served as an acolyte. Just like the children, you are invited to join us at the altar.

## Building St. Luke's, Iron Lightning

I t probably wasn't who you might pick to build a church in six weeks – twelve college age kids, a brand new deacon, and a couple of priests, most of them with no building skills or experience. However, that's who God sent to Iron Lightning community on the Cheyenne River Reservation in the summer of 1958.

Kris Olson from Seattle was one of those volunteers. Kris and I were in touch with each other that summer through the U. S. Mail, and two years later we were married.

Most of the group arrived just in time to attend Niobrara Convocation at Lower Brule. From there they moved into the vicarage in Dupree with Fr. James Rice, the vicar of St. Philip's. They cooked and ate in the church basement but there was no running water so the dishes were washed in the vicarage. One young woman from Iron Lightning was a member of the work camp and lived with the rest in Dupree. The group leader was Bill Crews, a brand new graduate of seminary in Berkeley, California and also a newly ordained deacon from the diocese of Oklahoma.

Fr. Rice and Fr. Jim Marrs, priest in charge of St. Luke's, both worked on the building also.

Each day the campers drove out to Iron Lightning in a VW bus and a car. People from the community came to watch and then to help, especially some of the young people. People in both Dupree and Iron Lightning brought them food and prepared whole meals for them.

On their third day at the site the Holy Eucharist was celebrated with an altar made of a pile of cement blocks and a board. Slowly at first, the 40 by 20 foot building began to rise up – first the cement block foundation, then the frame for the floor, then the sub-flooring, and then the walls. Siding and windows were next and then the roof and the sheet rock on the inside of the walls.

People from the Dupree and the surrounding area dropped by the vicarage to meet these young people who, instead of getting paid, had themselves paid for the privilege of coming to build a church on the Cheyenne River Reservation.

The campers saw how people, whether local residents or those just passing through, came to the church for help of one kind or another. The six weeks flew by. Toward the end of their time, when it was clear that they would get the church pretty much finished and usable by the time they left, they took a weekend off to tour the Black Hills, and several young people from Iron Lightning went with them.

Finally they reached their last Sunday and the church was ready for worship. The people gathered outside in a circle around the front door. Prayers were said and they all processed in, filling the church as they sang a hymn. Fr. Marrs celebrated Holy Communion with Bill the deacon preaching. It was a wonderful culmination of the summer's work and all the relationships that had been built.



In a letter to me Kris described what happened at the end of the service. "Afterwards, all the Indian people went out first & stood in a line & then we did the same. They came and shook hands with all of us, kids and all. I'm telling you, this really shook us up, & many of them had tears in their eyes. Quite a few of us, including myself were sobbing before we got thru. It was so emotional; it was hard to separate the tears from laughter. It's the hardest to say goodbye to the Clowns & Dupris because we've been closest to them. It makes me feel so humble to see how much the love of God is among these Indian people. What a small thing it is to give a summer's work to see the love of Christ in the Christian family. I wish I could do more here. Maybe there will be an opportunity, God only knows."

In the over eight years that Kris and I lived and worked on the Rosebud Reservation Kris was able to do more in various ways. The best came in 1970 when she began a Christian Children's Fund program on the Rosebud Reservation that enrolled 800 children. Through this program they received vouchers three times a year to purchase new clothes and supplies for school.

It is truly amazing what a volunteered summer can do.

Scholarships are available for ethnic communities, children of missionaries, bishops and clergy, and other particular wide-ranging eligibility for education and training.

#### Process

Applications are reviewed by scholarship subcommittees comprised of representatives from throughout the Church. Their recommendations are then reviewed and announced by the Scholarship Committee of the Episcopal Church.

Funding for the scholarships is derived from numerous trust funds. The amounts of the scholarships vary according to the availability of payouts from

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the funds. Annual payouts from the funds are determined by the Executive Council upon recommendation of its Investment Committee. Principal amounts of each fund are always maintained.

# Deadline for applications is April 16. Only complete applications will be considered.

#### Requirements

Requirements for applying for the scholarships include: the applicant must be an Episcopalian, must be a member of the Episcopal Church, and must have the endorsement of his/her bishop.
