### Odds, Ends and Updates

e had the opportunity to spend Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter on the Standing Rock Mission. The Good Friday service at Good Shepherd, Little Oak Creek was especially poignant. As I carried the processional cross, I led those gathered from the church up a steep hill to the base of a large wooden cross. We stood at the base of the cross as we prayed and then during the praying of the confession, one by one we hammered a large nail into the cross. It was a simple, yet powerful devotion. One we will never forget.

On Easter we were privileged to celebrate the Resurrection of our Lord at St. Paul's, Little Eagle; St. Peter's, McLaughlin; and St. Elizabeth, Wakpala on Saturday. Our Easter morning began with sunrise prayers at the cemetery in Wakpala and then breakfast at St. Elizabeth's. We went from there to St. James', Mobridge, Good Shepherd, Little Oak Creek and concluded our Easter Day celebrations at Holy Spirit, Firesteel. Six services, over 20 baptisms, 250 miles driven and many, many Easter meals reminded me of the amazing privilege and joy it is to serve among the people of the Diocese of South Dakota.

From the last Sunday of March through the first Sunday of May, I will have traveled to all four corners of the Diocese. We traveled from Vermillion to Standing Rock Mission to Sisseton Mission to Spearfish with stops in Aberdeen, Pierre, Brookings, Milbank, Rapid City, Webster and Sioux Falls (yes, occasionally I am in Sioux Falls.) I drove 4,700 miles in just over 5 weeks. Again, what a privilege to serve among such a gracious people and drive throughout one of the most beautiful parts of God's creation.

Last September during Convention I announced Council's approval for a process of moving Diocesan offices to Pierre, the theory being: "the Center of the Diocese should be in the center of the

Diocese." In mid April of this year the Diocese signed a contract to purchase a bishop's residence in Pierre. We hope to close on the property by mid June. We are also exploring a couple of options for office space in Pierre that can utilize existing church space.

The Diocese is borrowing the money for this move from a Diocesan fund with the hopes of paying ourselves back within the next several years. We have already received some pledges and contributions toward the purchase of this residence.

This entire move is an opportunity for ministry and for the Diocese to increase our "assets for ministry." Among other benefits, it reduces our cost for a bishop by providing a house instead of a housing allowance.

On April 11<sup>th</sup>, Deacon Richard Zephier was ordained a priest; he will be serving as priest in charge of St. Mark's, Aberdeen. On April 22<sup>nd</sup> Jerry Vander Lee will be ordained deacon. Jerry will serve through Calvary Cathedral as he continues his ministry as a chaplain at Avera Medical Center. He will be another conduit bringing the needs of the world to the ministry of the Cathedral, along with Deacon Arlene Pearsall. May 31<sup>st</sup> will be Bunker Hill's final Sunday as Rector of

# Dakota Hymn Sing helps keep language alive

**t. Peter's Episcopal Church** in Ft. Pierre is where people with connections to the Dakota language are meeting once a month for "Dakota Sing" or "Dakota Hymn Sing."

On the third Thursday of every month starting at 5:30 pm, participants "sing until they get tired, entirely in the Dakota language. And then they have soup and bread." The groups often include elders and the young and many in-between. The tunes are familiar, old hymns.

When the Dakota people were forcibly relocated to Dakota Territory after the Minnesota uprising of 1862, many were Episcopalian and brought their hymn books with them. The Rev. Samuel Hinman had done a lot of the translations, and he accompanied them from Minnesota.

Mary Ashley is the organizer of the Sing, and also plays the organ. She grew up hearing Dakota spoken, but is not fluent in it. "I think it's important to be around elders because then you hear how they pronounce Dakota and how they make the intonations. I think it's true what they say, the easiest way to learn Dakota is to sing it," says Mary.

outread Episcop **n** the mid-1960's the Diocese of South Dakota purchased a former dude ranch in the Black Hills for church camp use. In its fourth summer, a brochure for the camp stated: "the camp was purchased and set up with the principle in mind that in camping we come closer to nature, and thereby

discover the mighty works of God. The camping experiences give young people the opportunity of living in a Christian Community and help them discover for themselves who they are in relationship to God and each other. The activities center around daily worship."

Nearly five decades later, the purpose and mission of the camp remains the same. Each year, campers come to the beautiful Black Hills to try an "experiment" in living in Intentional Christian Community. Campers explore what it looks like, and what it means, to live in close quarters loving one another.

The camp season begins with Work Weekend on May 29-31<sup>st</sup>, followed by Staff Camp where the camp counselors are fully trained for the season.



#### General Convention 2015

Borrowed from an article by the Rev. David Seger in the April "Emmanuel Light."

he sources of governance or polity for The Episcopal Church are: (1) the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments; (2) the Constitution and Canons of The Episcopal Church; and (3) actions of The General Convention. In addition, each diocese is governed by its own constitution and canons and each parish by its by laws.

The General Convention is comprised of two legislative bodies - the House of Deputies (HOD) and the House of Bishops (HOB). The HOD is made up of clergy and laity, each diocese entitled to be represented by four ordained persons and four lay persons as well as four alternate clergy and four alternate lay persons. The HOB is comprised of every bishop diocesan, co-adjutor, and suffragan in the American succession. The HOD has approximately 800 plus members and the HOB about 200 bishops. When you add in another 800 alternates, volunteers, the Episcopal Church Women (ECW) which meets at the same time, visitors, families, and exhibitors there are about 5,000 people at the convention site. One wag described this gathering as a "beached whale." It certainly is cumbersome.

We are a very democratic group. It has been overly simply stated that when the founding fathers wrote the Constitution of the United States, they walked across the street and organized The Episcopal Church in the same fashion. There are some parallels, but that is not exactly the way it happened.

Proposed legislation, called resolutions, comes from deputies, bishops, interim bodies of the Convention, diocesan conventions and, at least in theory, could be proposed by individual congregations or even persons who sit in our pews every Sunday. The last

two would be quite a reach because of the expertise, time, and money it would take to put something forward.

During the triennial period between conventions, the Church is governed by the Executive Council, a group of bishops, priests, deacons, and laypersons elected by the General Convention. The Presiding Bishop and the President of the House of Deputies also appoint persons to various committees or taskforces that are called interim bodies. They address a variety of issues such as Small Churches, Liturgy & Music, Program & Budget, Investments, Pastoral Development, Structure of the Church, Constitution & Canons, and many more.

The highlight of the 78<sup>th</sup> General Convention is the election of a new Presiding Bishop to a nine-year term. The Nominating Committee for the election of the Presiding Bishop has prepared a list of bishops that will be presented to the House of Bishops for the election of the twenty-seventh Presiding Bishop. Following the election, the House of Deputies must affirm the election before it is complete.

A most uplifting part of the Convention is the opportunity to worship daily with fellow Episcopalians throughout this country and the world. It is so different from what we experience in our weekly worship services. It is so stirring that one hardly notices that we are worshiping not in a church, but in a very large convention venue.

Everything is oversized—seating for 7,000 +, very large altar on a platform, large choirs, many instruments and musicians, beautiful music, outstanding preaching, many voices and languages. There may be up to twenty communion stations, so the actual time of the communions is no more than 10-12 minutes.

On Sunday, the celebration of the Eucharist is even more spectacular. The processions are always magnificent. At most conventions there are three processions entering from different parts of the hall. The bishops process four abreast vested in their episcopal garb. The music is even more stirring with timpani and brass.

The Presiding Bishop is the celebrant and the preacher, but at this convention, the Presiding Bishop-elect will be the preacher. Attendance at the Sunday Eucharist is 10,000 – 12,000. Making your communion with 10,000 fellow Episcopalians touches our hearts and souls.

# Mindful Meditation in the prison system

deacon's ministry, in part, is going into the world and looking for ways to help our neighbors.

I had an opportunity a few weeks ago to attend a meeting at HSC (South Dakota Human Services Center in Yankton). The meeting was about Mindful Mediation, and the presenter was Dr. Michael McVay, a retired cardiologist and member of Christ Church. For the past year he and his wife Ellen have been teaching Mindful Mediation in the Old Rectory (at Christ Church) on Wednesday evenings in an effort to help us relieve stress and hopefully find serenity.

The meeting at HSC was attended by staff and volunteers (like me). The meeting impacted me so much, I asked Dr. McVay if he would do a presentation to the staff at MDSP (Mike Durfee State Prison). The Associate Warden Susan Jacobs made some inquiries and gave us the green light to proceed with planning and scheduling.

On Wednesday, March 25 we were greeted by Warden Dooley and Associate Warden Susan Jacobs and escorted to the training classroom. It was a meeting for administrative personnel only. We were together for almost two hours. Dr. McVay gave a PowerPoint presentation about Mindful Meditation supported by authoritative sources, backed by statistics and offered us a time of training, followed by our first meditation. It was very powerful. So many of the attendees had smiles on their faces with words of appreciation for Dr. McVay.

I am hopeful that in the months to come we can bring mediation to the staff and inmates.

*Update*: On April 28 this program will be presented to the South Dakota State Department of Corrections, including juveniles. On May 3 it will be presented again in Yankton to more staff. And John Keyes is being trained to teach Mindful Meditation.

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#### **Standing Committee**

With a Bishop in charge of the Diocese, the Standing Committee shall be the Bishop's Council of Advice. When the Diocese is without a Bishop...the Standing Committee of the diocese shall be the Ecclesiastical Authority as provided by the General Convention Constitution and Canons. The Standing Committee also plays a part in the ordination process and deals with certain property issues.

The Standing Committee consists of eight members, and election shall be made by the diocesan convention for a term of four years. Members are entitled to election for two terms. The Standing Committee meets 3-4 times a year, or as needed.

A member of Standing Committee is a voting delegate to Annual Convention. A member of Standing Committee is also a member of the Title IV Ecclesiastical Disciplinary Board.

The Mission of the Diocese of South Dakota is to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Christ through the ministry of all.
