Diocese partners with a generous God

he Diocese of South Dakota met in convention for the 125th time, this year at Cedar Shore Resort near Chamberlain. It was a lovely venue, as always, though most would have ordered better weather. 156 clergy and lay delegates were in attendance, plus quite a few alternates, visitors, and guests.

The Diocesan Stewardship Committee¹ planned the convention under the theme "Partners With A Generous God." Goal #7 under our "Partners With God" initiative is Stewardship – to motivate, educate, and support all to understand stewardship and promote responsible care of all God's gifts. Several aspects of stewardship were addressed at the Clergy Conference, in the convention workshops, and in our conscious effort to "go greener."

Clergy met October 1 and 2 with James W.N. Murphy, Associate Program Director of Planned Giving & Endowment Management for the Episcopal Church Foundation for discussions on Parish Endowment Development, Planned Giving, Wills, Trusts, and similar topics.

The sermons for the opening and closing Eucharist services, given by Bishop-elect John Tarrant and the Very Rev. Bunker Hill, and the re-presentation of "Partners With God" set the stage, informed our discussions, and sent us home with a vision and hope of the Kingdom of God that is both present and eternal. In Jesus' call to strive for the Kingdom of God we are asked to glorify God by the way we live our lives. If I - and we - can glorify God in all things and at all times, we will indeed be true Partners with a Generous God.

In the effort to "go greener" every year and to be better stewards of time and resources, the planners asked delegates to bring with them to convention their (or borrowed) copies of the Book of Common Prayer, Hymnal 1982, and Dakota Hymnal. This cut back considerably on paper used to produce worship booklets with material from these same books. We thank those delegates who read and abided by this request, and who were good sports about this and some other changes.

There will be more changes next year and for years to come. Jesus called us to follow him which causes us to grow and stretch. As you contemplate what it means to live in the Kingdom, to be partners with a generous God, and to glorify God in everything and at all times, find a way to discuss with members of your congregation and deanery, with your priest and Dean, how Diocesan Convention can be altered to better serve our ministry in and through our diocese and to address issues that confront our daily lives.

Business

There were no resolutions to be considered this year, but delegates did elect people to fill various offices:

- The Rev. Liz Powers (Mni Sose Cluster) is the Convention Representative to Diocesan Council, term expires 2013.
- Trial Court members: David Wheeler, Huron, (4 year term), The Rev. Mercy Hobbs, Vermillion and Santee, (5 year term), The Rev. Ryan Hall, Brookings (3 year term).

- **The Rev. George Parmeter** (Huron) will fill the 3 year term on <u>Standing Committee</u> (term expires 2012)
- The Rev. Sandy Williams (Belle Fourche) and Don Metcalf (Cheyenne River Mission) were elected to 4 year <u>Standing Committee</u> positions.
- <u>Provincial Deputy</u> position vacancies were not filled.

In addition, **Deacon Susan Lyman** was elected by the Eastern Deanery to another 4 year term as representative to Diocesan Convention, and Mrs. **Jean Lacher** was re-elected as President of the Standing Committee by that body.

Workshops

Workshops were presented by members of the Diocesan Stewardship Committee and each held twice to allow for a broad participation:

- <u>Stewardship 101</u>: An introduction to Christian stewardship – *Bishop-elect John Tarrant* gave his theology and insights on faithful Christian stewardship
- <u>Living Wi\$ely</u>: Explored money, faith, and getting out of debt – *Administrator Randy Barnhardt*
- <u>Annual Stewardship Program</u>: launching an annual pledge program *Dean Bunker Hill* laid the groundwork for launching an effective program of pledging in the parish.
- <u>Stewardship in a Native American Con-</u> <u>text</u> – *Karen Eagle, Mission, and a panel of experts* helped the group examine the challenges and opportunities for stewardship in a Native American Context.
- <u>Establishing a Parish Endowment</u> *Connie Lane, Rapid City* shared her expertise and belief that every church should have in place the structure necessary to enable the church to encourage legacy giving.

Introduction to "A New Partnership with a Generous God"

In the first order of business, the Very Rev. Bunker Hill introduced Fr. John Tarrant who re-presented the Partners with God initiative to convention. Here is a summary of the presentation.

BH: Today, our heavenly Father, it is once more and again, that we few of your hand-made servants are gathered in this sacred circle, heads bowed as humbly as we know how, facing the mother dust this side of the greedy grave.

We thank you for this day, a day we've never seen before, but one that has been coming since the dawn of creation. We thank you for the ministry of Bishop Robertson these past 15 years, and we pray for his health and well-being. We thank you for all of our new beginnings, but especially for this new beginning with our bishop-elect, Fr. John Tarrant. Generous Father, we are seeking, not just a new beginning, but a New Partnership with you and with Fr. John as our bishop.

Bless our new Bishop. Turpentine his head with the oil of understanding; set him on hallowed fire; let him down into the rich storehouse of scripture, tradition and reason where he can bring out treasures both old and new to edify ALL of your people.

Bless the man who is going to walk in the shoes of the apostles. Bear him up on eagle's wings. Let him fly in spirit beyond sun and moon and stars. Let heaven and earth come together in this place right now.

We thank you for blessing us, and we pray that as we seek to bless others, you will bring new life to our Diocese. We abandon ourselves to Jesus' promise that he has come to bring abundant life for all. In a new partnership with you, we seek that life for ourselves and for all of the people among whom we live.

This is your servant's prayer. So I hope. So may it be, in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. And all God's people said: Amen.

It's my privilege, today to introduce our bishopelect as he presents or perhaps I should say represents the Partners with God initiative that this body passed in 2007. Today, we call it a New Partnership with a Generous God because we are renewing our partnership with a serious intent of implementing it.

The entire Diocese took part in crafting this vision for ministry in the Diocese of South Dakota, and we intend for it to express who we are and where we hope to go together. It's our gift to Fr. John as we seek to be the best Diocese we can be. Together I believe we can be a model diocese for the whole Episcopal Church.

But we wouldn't have this vision today without the self-sacrificing leadership of The Rev. Canon Dr. Robert T. Wagner. And I invite you all to join me in expressing our thanks for the inspiring leadership that Canon Wagner has given us. Both the Vision and Mission of our Partners with God initiative focus on the most important thing that we can do together as a Diocese, and that is "ministry." In all of the storm and stress of our troubles as a denomination and a worldwide communion, it's easy to lose sight of the ministry to which God has called us. I believe that Fr. John has his sights clearly and firmly on our call to ministry. I also believe he will be "Servant to the Servants of God." So today, as Fr. John presents a "New Partnership with a Generous God," I'd like to paraphrase what John F. Kennedy said as he began HIS new initiative, called "The New Frontier": "Ask not what your Diocese can do for you, ask what you can do for your Diocese."

- Offer training and resources in sharing the Good News of Christ and understanding the Anglican traditions as they may be expressed within our various cultures to help us become Christ's Body active in the World.

<u>Goal: Community Engagement (Serving our</u> <u>Neighbors)</u>

• Encourage and empower persons to inform themselves and develop action plans to address human needs and issues of justice in local communities at the congregational level.

KEY ISSUES

The elaboration of various strategies for accomplishing our Goals is set out in the original Partners with God initiative passed by this Convention in 2007.

Key Issue: Priorities

My purpose today is to begin to prioritize these individual goals into a coherent first step in creating an environment in this Diocese which puts the work of ministry ahead of everything else.

My first priorities are Stewardship, Evangelism and Community Engagement. These three priorities define:

- who we are we are stewards of the bounty that God has given us.
- why we've come we are heralds of God's kingdom, and
- what we are to do we are called to love God and our neighbors.

Key Issue: Renewal

- I plan to begin implementing these priorities by listening to you.
- I want to hear how each of you articulate your understanding of your relationships with God, your family, your local church, the community in which you live and our country.
- I hope to engage your trust by offering you my trust in a spirit of partnership.

Key Issue: Spirit of Partnership

In particular, I want to hear how we can all work together in this Diocese as the Body of Christ. St. Theresa of Avila said, "Christ has no body now on earth but ours, no hands but ours, no feet but ours, ours are the eyes through which Christ's compassion is to look out to the earth, ours are the feet by which He is to go about doing good and ours are the hands by which He is to bless us now."

It is the work of the Holy Spirit to bind us together in love, and strengthen us for God's work as the Body of Christ. When communities of faith come together, their service to the Church and to the world has more impact.

I want to nurture a spirit of partnership in which:

- everyone can have their say,
- all can hear the gospel, and
- everyone can say with gratitude:

"I am an Episcopalian from South Dakota. Here am I, send me!"

UTO Grant applications for 2010 now available

D nited Thank Offering Grant applications are now available for 2010. Applicants can acquire their copy of the grant application and instructions from the Diocesan Office or at the UTO website: www.episcopalchurch.org/uto

Grant awards are for projects occurring during the year June 2010 through June 2011. Applications must be submitted by January 31, 2010, as outlined in the instructions. Since applications require the Bishop's comments and approval, a **diocesan deadline** will be **January 4, 2010**. Awards will be announced in May 2010.

This year the United Thank Offering is inviting each diocese to submit <u>one</u> grant application for the 2010 United Thank Offering grant cycle.

2010 UTO GRANT CRITERIA

The United Thank Offering supports programs that address compelling human needs by supporting the alleviation of poverty, both domestically and internationally, within the Anglican provinces, dioceses, and companion dioceses.

The United Thank Offering supports projects:

- That address poverty of women and children
- That make significant impact
- That demonstrate new and innovative work
- That are a part of a planned diocesan/ provincial mission strategy

The United Thank Offering will not fund:

- Capital fund campaigns or debt reductions
- Deferred maintenance
- Operational budgets, meaning the proposed budget and program is the same as the year before
- Debts obligated or incurred before the date of the grant award
- Purchase of consumable items (e.g., food, medicine, paper goods, toiletries, fuel, etc.)
- Scholarships, tuition, camp fees, and attendance incentives
- Emergency response

In Episcopal dioceses within the United States, the United Thank Offering will not fund:

- Previously funded requests
- Capital improvements that do not expand capacity to meet compelling human need or mission and ministry need in disadvantaged situations
- Programs regarded to be diocesan operating budgets

2010 UTO GRANT POLICY

The United Thank Offering Board will make grant award decisions in April 2010, which they will announce in May. Funds will be available June 2010 for expenses incurred June 2010 through June 2011. Grant monies are disbursed through the local diocese. Instructions for accessing granted funds are included in the grant award letter. Accounting is required. Instructions for accounting are sent to the contact person when funds are dispersed.

The UTO Board will accept one grant application per diocese within The Episcopal Church. The UTO will accept one additional grant application for a companion diocese from dioceses of The Episcopal Church who choose to form a relationship with a diocese from TEC or the greater Anglican Communion.

United Thank Offering grants support the Budget Priorities adopted by the 76th General Convention, the Millennium Development Goals, and the priority needs identified by the Primates for Theological Education for the Anglican Communion (TEAC). - more UTO on page 21

News Note from St. John's in Deadwood

n October 2009 St. John's choir members were called to meet at the Charley Utter Theater at the Deadwood Social Club. This brought a chuckle and harkens back to the early days of the church, as the theater is located above the Saloon No. 10. Organist and Choir Director Michael Ellison contacted the Keehn family who are the owners of these establishments for permission to meet there. The theater has a piano and the choir needed a place while a contractor and the church Junior Warden, Don Derosier, were directing repairs and drainage on the exterior of the church. With no electricity during the week the Wonderful Wednesday Supper and Bible Study had to be abandoned but the choir rehearsal could go on.



met at the school and the court house, but the most satisfactory place was the Langrishe Theater, as there was a piano there. The lady spear-heading the formation of the parish was Mrs. Helen Dennee, an actress, who was also the pianist. Together with only two other women and their children, she held the first organized Episcopal service in 1877 with over one hundred men attending. A gentleman read Morning Prayer. She went on to be the first president of the women's auxiliary, St. John's Guild, which paid for the land for the church and much of the construction and furnishings over the years. She was rewarded for her hard work by being given the honor of naming the parish and she chose the name of her home church, St. John the Baptist in St. John's, Newfoundland, which is a Cathedral.

So what goes around comes around. The parish is grateful to Deadwood Preservation for assisting with the necessary improvements and the Keehn family, who are church members, for giving the choir a place to have Wednesday evening rehearsals.


s a great season of Diocesan youth program draws to a close, the emphasis for youth ministry returns to our local congregations. Some of our churches have flourishing youth groups, but many churches are small and in isolated communities. I hear lots of people say they would like to see youth in the church again, but don't always know how to make that happen. So, we've started a project to make it easier for communities to get some good youth ministry going.

Thanks to the generous support of the Niobrara Convocation Women, the Diocese of North Dakota, and T-V Productions in Brookings, we will soon be able to offer every church in the Diocese a Basic Training DVD resource for starting or enhancing parish youth ministry. The training is specific to our South Dakota context, particularly the challenges faced in reservation ministry.

The DVD is based on the training workshop and youth event facilitated by **Deacon Terry Star**, from Standing Rock, ND. Deacon Star, in addition to being on the Executive Council of the Episcopal Church, is a Native Young Life leader and cultivates, with the Rev. John Floberg, a thriving youth ministry in Fort Yates and Cannonball, ND.

The training was held at St. Peter's in McLaughlin with the help of Father Rob Schwarz and Deacon Bea Skinner. Bishop-elect Tarrant attended the training, and Jay and Carson Vanduch of Brookings were present to film the event. Tyson White of Spearfish and Eagle Butte, and Calla Holzhauser of Pierre were there to represent young leadership in our Diocese.

Deacon Star offered some nuts and bolts of putting together a youth program all held together by a strong theology of Incarnation. As God has chosen to come and be among us, we can choose to be among young people. This model for ministry demands investment into the life of the community, and challenges us to be the church outside of the

GRACE HAPPENS

"One Man's Story"

I t was not a confession; the old man and I didn't have that kind of relationship. I did understood clearly that I couldn't tell this story while his wife was living. She died this year so here it is.

When he was in his 30's, six or seven years after his marriage, he met a beautiful woman to whom he felt a strong attraction. The attraction was mutual. He faced a critical decision. Would he follow this new "love" with all its promised passion and the new possibilities it might bring? It would mean leaving his wife and two sons. Or would he deny this new passion, breaking this woman's heart, and possibly his own, by ending the budding relationship before it could flower? He still loved his wife but, at that moment, not with the intensity of this new attraction. He agonized over the decision, but in the end he staved true to his wedding vows. His connection to the other woman ended in a tearful goodbye at the railroad station.

What really impressed me was his reason for staying with his marriage. He made the decision, not based on his feelings, but on his sense of fairness. It wouldn't have been fair for him to walk out on his wife. They had promised to build a family and a life together and were doing it. She had given birth to three of the four children they wanted to have. The first, a daughter, had died five days after she was born. To walk out on his wife seemed to him grossly unfair and so he told the other woman that there could be no relationship. This man understood something that C.S. Lewis would say in a radio broadcast years after this man made his choice. Speaking about *eros*, that is the feeling of being in love, Lewis said, "The sinfulness or innocence of the act of love does not depend in the least on the presence or absence of *eros*....This act, like any other, is to be judged according to the great rules: on the keeping or breaking of promises, on justice or injustice, on charity or selfishness. Fine feelings don't mend the matter."

This man decided, on the basis of justice, to keep his promises and he did right. I am very proud of him for that, and thankful too, because if he hadn't my life would have been very different. He was my father.

I'm sharing the story because it showed me so clearly a very important truth about truly successful relationships with friends, co-workers, family and especially in marriage. People get such mixed messages about what should be important in their lives, and in relationships. This story made clear that what makes for success in a marriage, or any important relationship, is something we learned in Sunday school, maybe even kindergarten: always keep your promises and play fair.
