

n September 27-28 I will be part of the fourth Diocesan Convention as your bishop.

In recent years we have shortened the Convention by one day in order to make it more accessible financially to more people. We have kept it in Pierre so that the centralized location would make travel easier for those living in the far corners of the Diocese. Gas prices at \$3.50-4.00 a gallon have caused us to adjust much of our Diocesan life.

We hope that these changes make it easier for people to manage both the time and cost that Convention requires without affecting the quality of the gathering. We are somewhat at the mercy of the Ramkota Convention Center in Pierre as far as a September date because of their scheduling. The price and set-up of that venue makes it worth the flexibility.

This year we are adding a "I'm proud to be an Episcopalian" picnic from 11:00 am to 3:00 pm on Friday, September 27th. This is open to anyone in the Diocese regardless if you will or will not be attending Convention. The Diocese will be providing hot dogs and hamburgers and we are asking folks to bring a dish to share. It should be a fun afternoon.

Diocesan Convention and Niobrara Convocation are the two times each year when we gather as a Diocese. We remind ourselves that despite our diversity we are one church, the body of Christ, which identifies herself as the Diocese of South Dakota.

This gathering is a small reminder that we are part of something larger than our individual congregation. We are small and medium size congregations; Native, Anglo and Sudanese;

we are city, small town and rural; but despite all of our differences we are Episcopalians and part of the one, holy and apostolic church.

United Thank Offering.

UTO is an organization founded by women in 1889 and originally supportive of women missionaries. Today, the United Thank Offering grants are awarded for projects that address human needs and help alleviate poverty, both domestically and internationally. In 2013 the Episcopal Church has awarded 48 grants for a total of \$1,517,280.91 – quite a total from those little blue boxes! South Dakota received a grant for \$65,856 for the repair and rebuilding of Holy Comforter Church on the Lower Brule reservation.

I urge you to pick up a little blue box, if you don't have one, and join the United Thank Offering. Put it in a convenient place. Take a moment each day to say thank you to God and put a coin in that box. We are not meant to be passive receivers, rather we are bid to be active participants in God's world.

ELCA elects Presiding Bishop

he Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton was elected Aug. 14 as presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). Eaton is the first female to be elected as a presiding bishop of the ELCA. Three out of the four nominees were women.

Eaton currently serves as bishop of the ELCA Northeastern Ohio Synod. Prior to becoming synod bishop, she served as pastor for ELCA congregations in Ohio. She earned a Master of Divinity degree from Harvard Divinity School in Cambridge, Massachusetts, and a bachelor's degree in music education from the College of Wooster in Wooster, Ohio. Eaton is married to the Rev. Conrad Selnick, an Episcopal priest who is rector of St. Christopher's by the River Episcopal Church in Gates Mills, Ohio.

Congregations in Transition

The Rosebud Episcopal Mission

The Rev. Lauren Stanley, formerly of the Diocese of Virginia, was called by the Rosebud Mission Council and began serving as the Priest in Charge of the Rosebud Mission on February 17, 2013. In addition to her serving the West side Churches of the Mission, Mo. Lauren works with the Intentional Young Adult Community at the Bishop Hare Center and also serves on the board of the Rosebud Habitat for Humanity Chapter.

St. Mark's, Aberdeen

St. Mark's continued to grow in faith, witness and strength during this past year and is now ready to begin the Search Process this Fall to call a half time Rector. The congregation continues to be blessed by the presence of Sovereign Grace Baptist Church, which rents worship space from St. Mark's and occupies the undercroft for their Sunday School and Church Office. Sovereign Grace's contributions to the life of St. Mark's have included continuing gifts of time, talent and treasure for building maintenance, landscaping, decorating and a sharing in the cost of installing central air conditioning for the Sanctuary.

St. Paul's, Brookings

The Rector's position is open following the recent retirement of Fr. Ryan Hall and his and his family's move to Nebraska and secular vocation. Bishop John has been working with the Vestry, who have begun the search process and have several candidates who are interested in the position. St. Paul's will be working with a Priest in Charge model, where the person called signs on for a two year ministry agreement as Priest in Charge, which if successful to both parties, can then be called as Rector.

St. Paul's, Vermillion

Following the Rev. Rita Powell and her family's move to Boston, Massachusetts, The Rt. Rev. Creighton Robertson was called and has graciously accepted to serve as Supply Priest and Search Consultant. As a stand alone position, the Vicar of St. Paul's will be only a part-time position, but with a lovely Rectory and all the advantages of being a University community to attract candidates for the

position, we are hopeful of finding a good Priest for Vermillion.

This past year the Rev. Rita Powell and the Rev. Rich Ressler left the Diocese to continue their ministry elsewhere. They both brought wisdom and knowledge to the Commission, and we keep them in our prayers as they continue their faith journey. They will be greatly missed in our Diocese.

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COM Activities

The COM continues to meet twice a year at Trinity Church in Pierre. As I have stated before, we are grateful to Trinity and all their members for so willingly sharing their church for Diocesan meetings. Their gift of welcoming and hospitality is very much appreciated.

Our meetings begin on Friday afternoon with prayer followed by our business session. We always have on our agenda a review of the people in the process. We track their educational formation and hold them up in prayer. Each individual in the process has an Advocate on the Commission who keeps in touch with them between meetings and reports on their progress when the COM meets. Everyone on the Commission is always available to assist each of them in any way possible.

We also make recommendations to our Bishop on people in the process, and meet with individuals who are discerning their ministry. We finish business by noon on Saturday. It is always a busy, productive, and Christ filled weekend.

This past year we had the privilege of interviewing or "visiting with" eight individuals who are discerning their call to ordained ministry. Two of those are attending or will be attending seminary. The other six are being locally trained. The Commission truly enjoys our visits with those who are discerning their ministry and enjoys walking their walk with them. It is truly a blessing to be involved in that part of their lives.

At the present time, we have 14 individuals in the process. Three individuals are in discernment. Discernment is the time when they explore and wrestle with their call to ministry. Eleven are Postulants, who are pursuing their academic path either locally or in seminary. When a Postulant is about three-quarters through their academic studies they can apply for Candidacy.

COM continues to host, with the Standing Committee, informal receptions at Niobrara Convocation and Diocesan Convention. We have found this to be a good way to connect with those who are discerning their call to ministry, either lay or ordained, and provides opportunity to ask questions. We enjoy getting

to know individuals from around the Diocese and hear about their faith journeys.

The COM keeps Bishop John and the entire Diocese in our prayers. We offer prayers of thanksgiving for everyone who is involved in the ministry of the Diocese, either lay or ordained. Ministry continues to be alive and well in the Diocese of South Dakota, thanks to all of you!

Ecumenical Relations Association of Christian Churches of SD Report to 2013 Convention

This group is comprised of 10+ representations from different denominations within South Dakota. Ours is a ministry of presence, advocacy and support. Currently the group has been meeting on a quarterly basis in order to address the needs and concerns of the people we are serving.

The ACCSD, in cooperation with the U.S. Military and organizations supporting released imprisoned persons, offered a free workshop in August 2012 entitled "Welcoming Them Home." This workshop was held in Pierre, Rapid City and Sioux Falls. This program was designed to help clergy and laity of faith-based groups as well as organizations and individuals to better understand the challenges these two groups face coming home. Those who attended were educated about needs, available resources, and consider developing supportive measures, perhaps in partnership with others, benefitting all.

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- The ACCSD is an advocate for Children At Risk. The goal is to improve family income, children who are in assistance programs, support the Unemployment System that can better help working families. In addition the ACCSD supports that all children should have full health care, have childcare, after-school and youth programs and remove sales tax from groceries and utilities.
- The ACCSD is an advocate for Bread Days, sponsored by Bread for the World. This annual event, which is held when the SD Legislation is in session, is a faith-based event to raise awareness and stir action on issues of poverty and hunger.
- The ACCSD advocates an end to predatory lending and ending video lottery.
- The ACCSD advocates help for farm crisis resources and peace and justice issues that affect our state.
- The ACCSD is developing a training session for clergy that addresses qualifications/specific challenges in ministering to multiple denominations.

Minutes of Convention

128th Annual Convention (2012) The Episcopal Diocese of South Dakota Ramkota Conference Center - Pierre, South Dakota September 21-22, 2012 "Partnering With God: Transforming the Church"

Plenary Session I

Call to Order: The 128th Annual Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of South Dakota was called to order by Bishop John Tarrant at 7:05pm. An opening prayer was given by Canon David Hussey.

Introductions: Bishop Tarrant thanked the Black Hills Deanery for their work as hosts of this year's Convention. Canon David Hussey will be in charge of the Dispatch of Business. All messages and requests for time with the Bishop should go through Canon Hussey. Microphones are set up and ready to go. Please use them when you wish to address the Convention. There are pages available to help or carry messages. Use your yellow card to call them.

Bishop Tarrant introduced The Rev Margaret Watson, the Priest in Charge of Cheyenne River Mission. Also, The Rev Jean Mornard, the Rector of Grace Church, Huron. She will be installed on October 14.

Bishop Tarrant announced that The Rev Kate Stebinger has transferred to the Diocese of Minnesota.

St. Andrew's, Bonesteel closed on May 12. Trinity Church in Watertown is in transition, looking to do something different with their building and ministry.

An overview of the schedule was given. Information is in your packet. Housekeeping announcements were made.

Bishop Tarrant explained the M&M containers. They are a fund raiser for the establishment of a Youth Ministry Fund. It has been learned that people are more apt to donate to an established fund rather than to the Diocese. The containers will hold quarters, or coins of all sizes, as well as cash and checks. They can be refilled many times. Please be generous.

Anti Racism Committee: Sam Robertson, chair of the Anti Racism Committee, asked his committee to stand. He said the committee will be using a manual published by the national church at meetings this coming year. They have done a program in Vermillion as well as two sessions of Dakota Experience. It was decided not to continue doing the program at the same time as Dakota Experience as there is so much material to cover for both programs there is not enough time. Bishop Tarrant and Sam plan to travel to different areas of the Diocese to present the program every other month. They will begin with the Cathedral, Sisseton, and Wagner.

South Sudan Project Presentation: Rhoda showed a video about the importance of educating women and girls in South Sudan. They are the greatest untapped resource. Studies show that there is a 90% economic return on educating women and girls as opposed to 40% for males. Educated females are healthier and have healthier children. We need to continue our work in South Sudan.

Moses Joknhial will finish his work at SDSU in early December. He then plans to return to South Sudan to get projects going. There is need for a new truck, more school buildings, a perimeter fence, latrines, teachers, school supplies, desks, and uniforms. He thanked the Diocese of South Dakota for being the heart and backbone of the project. They are especially thankful for the prayer books, hymnals, and Bibles. He acknowledged UTO for the funding for work on the school and clinic. There is much work to be done and he is hopeful we can continue to work together.

General Convention Presentation: Dean Ward Simpson and Pat Woolley, two of the deputies to General Convention, gave an overview of the Convention. Ward introduced the rest of the deputation: Rev Kim Fonder, Rev George Parmeter, Rev Kathy Monson Lutes, Tammy Fonder, Jean Lacher, Dennis Potter. There will be a chance to hear more and ask questions at the workshop on Saturday afternoon.

Bishop's Address: Bishop John Tarrant addressed the 128th Convention. The Bishop reflected that we have been presented with the opportunity to learn both in the challenges we have faced and the mistakes we have made. He quoted a simple model for evaluating any activity: What did you do? What happened? What did you learn? He spoke of the changes and challenges in the Church and our grieving of the church we knew passing away. There comes a time to pass through the grieving and embrace the life that awaits us with the God of the living. There have been two churches reopened on Lower Brule and St John's in Oglala is open again. We have the Rosebud Young Adult Intentional Community going on the Hare Center, the vibrant Youth Ministry on Standing Rock and an international Taize event coming to Red Shirt on Pine Ridge. This is all God's business. We need to be praying for God's business and get others to pray for this business. God has called us to trust that He will do more than we can ask for or imagine.

Compline: Led by Shelli Vallis, St Andrew's Rapid City.

Recess: 8:50pm

Plenary Session II

Following Morning Prayer led by St James, Belle Fourche, Bishop John Tarrant called the Second Plenary Session to order at 8:50am.

Deacon Charlie Walker from Trinity Pierre announced that the Knights Templar of the Masonic Lodge have selected Rev Ryan Hall from St Paul's Brookings for a trip to the Holy Land in Feb.

Credentials Committee Report: Deacon Marty Garwood announced that of 73 authorized clergy 46 were in attendance; of 125 authorized lay delegates 88 were in attendance. Therefore a quorum was declared.

Parliamentarian: Steve Sanford was introduced and thanked by the Bishop for his tremendous gift of being the Chancellor for the Diocese. Steve reviewed procedures for speaking and making motions.

Minutes: Finding no additions or corrections for the minutes of the 2011 Convention, Bishop Tarrant declared them approved as printed.

Call for motion to accept Reports by Title: Motion by Dean Ward Simpson to accept reports by title by various commissions and committees submitted and printed in the *South Dakota ChurchNews* in July/August and September/October issues or otherwise distributed; seconded by Rev Kim Fonder; motion carried.

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Constitutional Amendment: The Very Rev. Ward Simpson, for the Committee on Resolutions, did the second read of Constitutional Amendment #01: Resolved, that the One Hundred Twenty-seventh Convention of the Diocese of South Dakota amend the Constitution of the Diocese of South Dakota, Article VII, Section 1 (Membership) to include deacons, as well a presbyters and lay persons eligible for election to the Standing Committee of the Diocese. The amended section would read as follows: The Standing Committee shall consist of eight members made up of four confirmed adult communicants of this Church in good standing and four canonically resident members of the clergy, of which no more than two shall be deacons. Dean Simpson moved the question, seconded by Gloria Pearson, Christ Church Yankton. No discussion. The amendment passed in a voice vote by orders. This will officially replace the previous text in the Constitution.

Elections: Pat LeBeau introduced nominees for Standing Committee:

1 Presbyter for 4 year term: The Rev Margaret Watson, The Rev Kathy Monson Lutes, The Rev George Parmeter. 1 Lay Person for 4 year term: Johnny Wilson, Jan Sanford

Ballots were distributed, marked, and collected for counting.

Budget Presentation: Randy Barnhardt, Diocesan Administrator, gave a Power Point Presentation using pie charts, graphs, and other graphics to explain the Diocesan financial status. He went through the proposed balanced budget. Randy noted the increase in the Block Grant to Aided Dioceses from General Convention, the decrease in Endowment income, a shift to taking 4.3% of Endowment income for budget, and a 1% increase in Diocesan asking. It was noted looking over time, the amount of giving from people to churches and churches to Diocese has remained steady even through the hard economic times. Mission Clergy will receive a one time increase of \$2000 as well as a percentage increase and a COL increase this year. Medical insurance premiums have decreased 10% and employees will be taking over a larger share this year. Travel money for clergy is increased by \$2000 to \$7000 per year. Some travel reimbursement for non stipendiary clergy is also in the budget.

There has been a change in the property insurance company. In some cases the coverage went up and costs are down. Property insurance policies are with the Church Insurance Group.

Julie Gehm asked about the value of the endowments. It is about \$6.4 million as of July 2012. This is up from \$5.7 million in 2011. The Investment Committee made a decision to reduce the amount withdrawn to help keep the growth going for the future. The investments are being reviewed.

Jim Pearson, Christ Church Yankton, made a motion to accept the budget, seconded by Connie Vicuna, Grace Church Huron; approved.

UTO Presentation: UTO Chair Diana Regan asked any UTO coordinators present to come forward as well as Father Rob Schwarz and Jeanne and others from Standing Rock. Father Rob explained the need for a building at St Peter's Church in McLaughlin. It has a very active congregation, is a meeting place for the youth group, and had a small building with no basement. The St Peter's and Good Shepherd ladies have been making quilts, pillows, aprons and other handmade items for sale to raise \$3000 to help the building project for the youth group. The project has just been awarded \$67,000 by the UTO.

Father Rob introduced Brian Barry from the Diocese of Long Island. He is planning to enter seminary and is required to do a year of service beforehand. He is working closely with Father Rob.

Youth Ministry Presentation: Rev Rita Powell was pleased to say that exciting things are happening <u>by</u> youth <u>for</u> the Diocese. We need to remember that youth is not just a special interest group but the energy and questioning we need to continue and grow the church.

Michael Two Bulls and Quineta Hairy Chin spoke about their experience living in the Taize Community in France this past summer. They participated in prayer 3 times a day, worked within the community, conducted workshops for others from around the world to teach about Lakota culture, learned new languages themselves, and connected with others who are "with church". Feels it gave them a grounding and a community to deal with the sense of isolation that sometimes comes living on the Reservation.

When Brother John from Taize visited in South Dakota last year he visited Christ Church, Red Shirt Table with Father Robert Two Bulls from Minnesota. It was a discussion they had about the painful story of life on the reservation where Father Two Bulls spoke of a need for new songs to be sung there that was the seed for the Taize event to be held at Red Shirt on May 24 - 27, 2013. This will be part of the "pilgrimage of trust on earth" being planned by the Taize community in France. It will be a weekend of prayer and workshops, a 3 day long experience of communion. This is an ecumenical event. It creates possibility of relationship across divisions through the planning as well as attending the event. If you are interested in helping to plan, please attend the workshop this afternoon.

The Rosebud Intentional Community is going along

with two people in residence at the Broken Leg House over the winter. This type of community is springing up across the country, young people putting up their lives for the Gospel. Mikayla Dunfee from St Andrew's in Rapid City told her story of coming to the Intentional Community. She had the opportunity to travel to Taize last fall and is excited to see the relationship grow. She and Kieran have been doing prayers 3 times daily at the chapel to ground themselves and be prepared for what God is calling them to do. Kieran Conroy is from New York State and has attended Harvard Divinity School. He had worked with new church planting, Taize, and Native American community in New England. He was working in Nebraska when he heard about Rosebud Intentional Community and wanted to be a part of the work here. Mikayla thanked the Bishop, the Diocese, and the Rosebud Mission Council for believing in them.

Rita spoke about the excellent camp this summer at Thunderhead. A musician she knows, Michael Smith, came to work with the children on music and worship. He worked with the high school camp to compose a Taize style chant that will be used here at Convention worship and around the Diocese. The chant is influenced by the Taize experience, the Lakota Hymnal, and the surroundings of the Black Hills.

Chris Soukup, from Sioux Falls, spoke about his involvement as a counselor at TEC. He has experienced personal change in his relationship to the church and has seen that change in TEC as well. He was pleased to see the connections children had made and kept from one year to the next as they came back to TEC. Chris was interviewed for an article by the Washington Post.

Rita commented that all the youth ministry around the Diocese has a way of being intertwined and supporting each other. Bishop Tarrant thanked Rita and all the young people for their work and dedication. They are an amazing group!

Capital Campaign Presentation: Bishop Tarrant reported that Horizons Communications had been hired to study the feasibility of doing a Capital Campaign. That study showed that we need to work to flesh out the programs and get them running well. It is important to get the engineering right and have a solid product and then work to raise the money. That is what we are doing. It agrees with the recommendation to establish a specific Youth Ministry Fund in the Diocese.

Recess: The Convention recessed at 10:15 until 10:45 for Eucharist with Renewal of Baptismal Vows, Renewal of Ordination Vows, and Blessing of Oils. Luncheon will be immediately following Eucharist. Workshops will begin at 1:30. There will be no Stewardship or Anti Racism Workshop.

Convention Reconvened: Convention reconvened at

3:20pm. Announcement of raffles and drawings were made. Next Convention will be September 27-28, 2013 at the Ramkota in Pierre. Hosts will be the Eastern Deanery.

The 128th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of South Dakota adjourned at 3:25 with a Blessing from Bishop Tarrant.

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State of Youth Ministry in South Dakota, Report to 2013 Convention

I would like to thank the Niobrara Council, Calvary Cathedral Youth Leaders, the Mission Clergy, the

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TEC Board, Mary Armin, Randy Barnhardt, and Bishop John Tarrant for all of the support, friendship, and shared ministry that has helped begin to build a Diocesan network of ministries by, for, and with young people. It has been an exciting five years of work and dreaming together, and I am grateful to each and every one of you. I believe that the youth and young adult ministry is ready to be coordinated, nurtured, and expanded in the coming years.

Taize-Pine Ridge, and Campus Ministry
This is the hardest story to tell in a quick summary
form! I know you've all seen it, but the ENS article
is the best and most comprehensive report on the

Taize is a great friend for South Dakota. It is a simple catalyst for campus ministry that can reach people across denominations. There are vibrant prayer and ministry options related to Taize at the School of Mines (Erin Schendzielos,) USD in Vermillion (Tom Emanuel,) and SDSU (Chris Soukup.) There is also a consistent youth-led Taize prayer at Calvary Cathedral. Taize has hosted South Dakota young adults (Mikayla Dunfee, Micheal Two Bulls, and Quinetta Hairy Chin,) as "permanents" or volunteers and would be happy to continue to provide that opportunity for the right young people.

Thunderhead Camp

TEC, finally, is fully reclaimed from the tragic episode in its past. We have set a precedent for safe church practices with all program staff and recreated a culture of trust and community. We have seen a significant increase in young Native participation. We have seen numbers rise from approx 11-15 campers per session when I arrived to 22-31 campers per session this summer. In 2007, there were zero campers at Family Camp. In 2013, there were 4 families for a total of 18 people. We have created a kind of pilgrimage experience, with chapel twice daily and the framework of love and community as the abiding theme.

Interim camp manager John Beebe has done work that will leave a legacy. He has taken meticulous care of the property, and the camp is truly a joyous and welcoming place.

Standing Rock Youth Ministry

The legacy of a relationship with North Dakota's Native Young Life and the initial explorations for the ministry with Deacon Brandon Mauai have taught us many things. In the coming year, Joe Skinner, Kyle Hawk Bear, and Quinetta Hairy Chin are gearing up to run the ministry with Contact Time, and Fusion4. They live in the communities they will be serving, which is important. They will be paid hourly, to encourage greater accountability and better use of resources. We know that starting a ministry is never easy, rarely linear. But we also saw that great success was possible if we can maintain some consistency.

Rosebud Young Adult Intentional Community Thanks to Bill Tesch and the ELCA for bringing us this possibility! The first year, summer plus the school year, was a real success. Sam Adams, Mikayla Dunfee, and Kieran Conroy are to be congratulated on their pioneering this interesting new ministry. The Community Rule, emphasizing prayer and a listening presence in the community has won over local church leadership. This ministry is an important new experiment for the church — both because of what it means for young people to be leading/imagining new ways of being church, but also because of what it means in the slow, careful work of living together as native and non-native Christians. It also serves some important church functions — welcoming mission groups and as a possible center for youth ministry.

2014 Proposed Program Budget Notes

- 1. Salary and Housing: Salaries are budgeted with an incremental increase for years of service of approximately 1.25%. The Current budget reflects nine FTE clergy, one FTE Diocesan Youth Coordinator, 1 PTE Standing Rock Mission Youth Coordinator, 2 PTE youth helpers on the Standing Rock Mission, 4 PTE clergy, 1 PTE lay staff position on the Rosebud Mission and one PTE TEC Director.
- **2. Medical Insurance:** Premiums are budgeted for a 10% increase.
- 3. General Convention Deputies: Budget to include payment of registration fees, estimated at 450.00 per delegate, plus an allowance of 2,000.00 per delegate. 8 delegates plus 1 bishop.
- 4. Niobrara School for Ministry: Christian Formation, Lay Ministry Formation, and the Dakota Experience are part of the Niobrara School for Ministry.
- **5. 2014 Congregational Support:** Budget for a 2% increase over 2013 pledges.
- 6. Chapter Endowment Support: 4.6% of a three year running average of market value of investments, reported on December 31 of 2011, 2012 and April 30, 2013.
